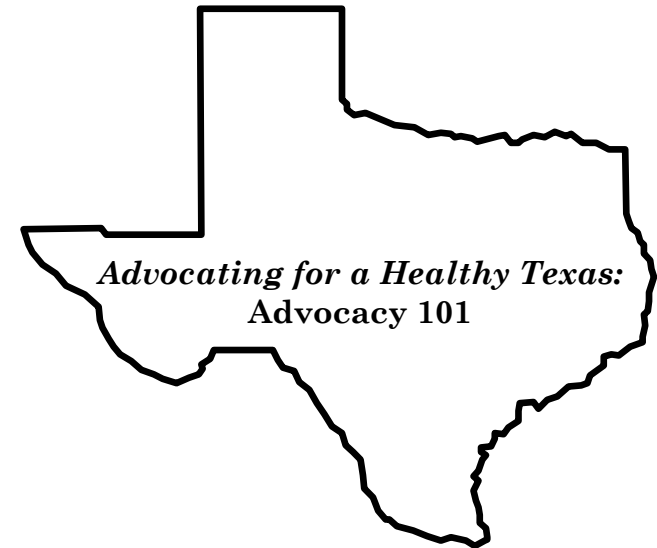
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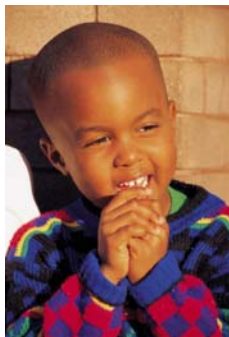
ADVOCATING FOR A HEALTHY TEXAS: ADVOCACY 101

The Texas state government is of significant importance to the delivery of health and human services in Texas. State statutes address programs for children and youth, the aged, people with mental or physical disabilities and the poor, among others. The Texas Legislature establishes the policies and budgets affecting most governmental and voluntary health and human services programs in the state.

Advocating for a Healthy Texas: Advocacy 101 covers the definition of advocacy, lobbying vs. advocacy, an overview of the Texas Legislature and how legislative bills become law, keys to effective communication with government officials and how to identify and develop health and human services public policy issues.

Objectives:

- Learn what advocacy is and how to be an effective advocate for health and human services issues.
- Receive an overview of the Texas Legislature and develop an understanding of how the Legislature effects the delivery of health and human services in Texas.
- Learn how to identify and develop health and human services public policy issues and how to effectively advocate for change in public policies.



TRAINERS

Randall K. Ellis is the Senior Director of Government Affairs at Legacy Community Health Services where he oversees the organization's policy and advocacy efforts at the local, state and federal levels. Prior to working for Legacy, Ellis served as the Executive Director of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas. At LGRL, he led the effort to defeat anti-gay foster care and adoption legislation, lobbied on the importance of work place protection for LGBT Texans and worked to educate the public on the issue of marriage equality. He began his work in politics with State Representative Garnet Coleman, serving as the Representative's District Director. He also served as a policy analyst in Representative Coleman's capital office where he worked on issues of civil rights, HIV/AIDS, Medicaid, drug addiction and treatment, and mental health. A native Houstonian, Ellis received his BA in Economics and Romance Languages from Washington and Lee University in Lexington VA. He is currently working on his thesis to complete a Master's Degree in Public Health at the University of Texas School of Public Health—Houston. Ellis will conduct the training January 7, 2009.

Nicole D. Porter is Policy Director for Texans Together. Previously, Porter served as a Public Policy Analyst with CHILDREN AT RISK and as the Director of the ACLU of Texas' Prison and Jail Accountability Project. She graduated from the University of Texas at Austin with a Master's Degree in Public Affairs from the LBJ School of Public Affairs. Her master's thesis addressed exploring self employment as an economic strategy among formerly incarcerated African Americans. Porter received her BA in International Affairs from Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore MD. She also studied African Politics at the University of Ghana, West Africa. Porter has also worked for the Applesseed Foundation and the National Women's Political Caucus. Porter will conduct the training January 8, 2009.
